Game of Thrones and Dissertations are similar: both of them are sophisticated and complicated.

But when it comes to viewings, Game of thrones and dissertations differ. Some episodes of Game of Thrones reached up to 90 **MILLION** viewings. We would be thrilled if only 90 people read our dissertations.

But hey. After watching the finale of game of thrones, I felt empty ... I felt a consumer waiting for someone else to feed me...

HOWEVER, When I **submitted my dissertation** ... I felt ready to **change the world**.... Full of ideas and projects ... ready to start publishing my dissertation and exploring new research programs... I felt the empowerment of a producer who wants to keep producing.

If the purpose of academia is to count viewings, reads, and citations, then Hollywood would beat us. But if the purpose of academia is to empower people, then we may have a chance at winning.

I come from a humble family, my parents never made it beyond middle-school, yet they invested in educating me and my siblings.

I grew up in Lebanon, a country ravaged by a 30-year civil war. As in Game of Thrones, problems were solved mainly by fighting, literally by hurting and killing one another.

I didn't like this. I wanted to be different.

I liked the way mathematicians solve problems, without hurting others. I found hope in education. So I studied and studied ... I attended four higher educational institutions in three different countries, including Europe and the US. I earned masters degrees in mathematics, philosophy, and theology. **BUT IN none of these institutions and programs**, did I feel empowered and ready to shape the world, as I feel now after 7 years at the graduate school of education at Berkeley. It's here and now that my childhood dream materializes and I feel set for a promising journey.

My fellow graduates share the same empowerment. Zohra, a colleague graduating today, started her doctoral program wanting to answer her 1,000 questions, and is leaving with 1 Million other questions. Instead of answering her questions, the doctoral degree gave her “the ability to replace false assumptions with **theories** to be investigated, the opportunities to observe with **compassion** the complex nature of the human condition, and the habit of choosing **curiosity** over complacency.”

Zohra just captured what constitutes a genuine empowerment that can make the World Great Again. Allow me to share with you why GSE-Berkeley was great for us.

First and foremost, GSE is a place where people from different ethnicities, religions, political views, nationalities, sexual orientations, and any status... feel SAFE to VOICE who they are.

In GSE Berkeley, authority does not reside in status but in the shared knowledge of the group. At the GSE in Berkeley, we do not say "I work under a professor" but "I work WITH a professor."
